On February 15, UNEP and the German **Federal Ministry for Economic Cooperation** and Development (BMZ) hosted a virtual side sessions at the OECD Forum on Due Diligence in the Garment and Footwear Sector titled Threading your way out of the policy tangle: coordination for a sustainable and circular textile value chain. The session brought together governments and industry representatives from different regions to discuss the impact of emerging policies and strategies on the global value chain, as well as opportunities for more systematic policy coordination and engagement between policy makers and voluntary textile industry initiatives. 


The Fashion Industry Target Consultation (FITC) survey and regional workshops have been successfully completed! The FITC survey was open for public consultation for three months, and received responses from 380 industry stakeholders from across all regions, in addition to the feedback collected from regional workshops with a total of 226 participants. The collective feedback from this consultation process will be incredibly valuable in refining the final set of Fashion Industry Targets, which will provide direction for the fashion industry in becoming netpositive. The UNEP Textiles team would like to thank everyone who participated and shared their feedback - the finalized set of targets will be released in June, and we will share more information on them in the coming months




Under the ongoing EU funded project "Innovative Business Practices and Economic Models in the Textile Value Chain (InTex)" UNEP organized an in-person all partners meeting from February 13–17 in Paris, France. The meeting reviewed the progress made by the InTex project (up until now) and provided an excellent peer to peer forum opportunity for the project's national implementing partners from Tunisia, Kenya and South Africa to exchange and learn from each other on best practices, the implementation's strengths and challenges while also taking advantage of south-south cooperation opportunities.

A new case study report from **UNEP** looks at environmental hotspots in textile value chains in Thailand and trade policy instruments that can have an impact on sustainability and circularity. It builds on UNEP's work on environment and trade, and its framework for Sustainability and Circularity in the Textile Value Chain. Trade and trade policy have an important role to play in the transition towards a green and circular economy, yet its potential has not yet been fully realised. A new report from The Science Based Targets initiative (SBTi) and World Resources

Institute provides guidance to support companies in the apparel and footwear sector in setting ambitious science-based emissions reduction targets. This guidance is intended for companies across the apparel and footwear value chain—retailers, brands, finished goods manufacturers, mills, etc.—that are primarily engaged in activities that contribute to the production, sale, and transportation of apparel and footwear products. A recent briefing by the European Environment Agency analyses the patterns and trends in EU used textile exports from 2000 to 2019 and shows how exports have increased year by year and shifted from mainly going to Africa to being almost equally exported to Africa and Asia. The brief highlights the major challenges around what happens to used textiles in the importing countries and also shows how current and proposed EU policies aim to address these export challenges. In the News



Reuters reports that annual plastic production in G20 countries could rise to 451 million tonnes by 2050 (according to current rates of growth) unless a comprehensive and legally binding global treaty to curb consumption is implemented. The UN began negotiations in November on an agreement to tackle plastic pollution, with the aim of drawing up a legally binding treaty by the end of 2024.
